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# We Are More Than A Diagnosis Luke Rossi & Kristina Walz Students at the Chicago School of Professional Psychology Edited by Dr. Sandra Siegel, Coordinator of IAODAPCA Advanced Accreditation Program

In 2021, 16.5% of the American population over age 11 met the criteria in the DSM-5 for a substance use disorder (SUD; U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, 2023). But how did each of these individuals get to this point? Every individual has their own story. They are more than just a diagnosis. Clinicians who are able to understand someone's story are in a better position to treat them. By understanding their story, we can learn about strengths that can be utilized in the treatment plan/process. We can also understand triggers/difficulties that they have experienced. Without the use of a holistic model, we may miss some of these important pieces. So, what is the holistic model and how can we apply it in our work?

The holistic model includes six components that impact an individual's identity, and they include biological, psychological, social, cultural, spiritual, and political systems. Each system has potential to impact an individual's SUD. While it is important to explore each system individually, it is also important to acknowledge the ways in which the systems interact with one another. Adedoyin et al. (2014) posited, "holism, therefore, suggests that there are different levels of explanation for behavior, including addictive behaviors, which cannot be reduced to one ele-

ment of that behavior or the addiction itself' (p. 538). Given the level of complexity within these different systems and elements of behavior, a one size fits all approach cannot adequately meet all clients' needs. Each client's journey is unique, therefore, the way we connect with and understand them needs to be individualized, including treatment approaches. Clarke and Scholl (2020) identified the importance of acknowledging and incorporating client preferences to build strong therapeutic rapport and effective treatment care plans. To implement the holistic model well, we need to dive into each system more deeply.

## THRESHOLDS

Of all the people who reported a substance use condition in the last year,

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### **Biological**

The umbrella of the biological system generally addresses a person's genetics, biochemical make-up, and neurological and physical functioning. Substance use changes the brain's normal functioning reward system by decreasing natural dopamine production. This can have a significant impact on brain chemistry which impacts the way a person experiences pleasure (Sharif-Brown, 2023). Beyond brain functioning, counselors should also be curious about other biological concepts, such as medical illnesses, co-occurring disorders, family history, diet, and fitness. Each person's biological system may be a source of strength or an area that requires support. If a client is experiencing a co-occurring disorder, increasing communication between the counselor and the client's psychiatrist would be beneficial. On the other hand, if a client enjoys going to the gym to workout, this may be an area to incorporate into the treatment plan.

## **Psychological**

The psychological system can include a person's personality, mood, and behavior. This system is particularly important for counselors, so they can address items such as thinking patterns, schemas, level of insight, and coping strategies. A client may have a strong level of insight that can be utilized for deeper and richer understand ding of the difficulties they are facing. The counselor can validate this strength throughout their sessions. However, if a client does not currently have many coping strategies, the counselor could foster the development of new strategies.

#### Social

The social system impacts how a client interacts with others and the environment. A counselor may explore their client's family relationships, connections with friends or significant others, education and employment, and sources of support. If a client has a strong familial bond, they would benefit from including them in their recovery journey. However, if a client has become isolated through substance use, the counselor may want to offer opportunities to build new healthy relationships with others in their community. Dr. Maté speaks to the importance of a healthy social system because isolation can not only lead people into addiction but also become a part of maintaining their addiction as the substance becomes the most important part of their life, even beyond social connections (Maté, 2020).

#### **Spiritual**

The spiritual system can be used to give meaning and purpose in life. For some clients, this might include religion, and for other clients, this may be more of a general belief in something greater than themselves. DiClemente (2013) recognized that people may have strong positive, negative, or mixed feelings about religious practices. For clients who have difficulty with religion, the counselor can help them understand that there are multiple forms of spirituality because spirituality is not exclusively religion. If a client has a strong spiritual connection, support groups like Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) or Recovery Dharma may have a strong positive impact on their recovery. If a client has difficulty with religion, the counselor may want to provide alternative options, such as SMART, to help with their recovery journey.

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#### **Political**

The political system addresses local, state, and federal policies as well as legal issues. Counselors should explore areas of a client's identity that may be impacted by policy, such as their socioeconomic status, gender or sexual orientation, age, and race. A client who holds privilege may have access to more treatment services or options for care that those who live in marginalized communities. If a client is facing discrimination in any area, the counselor can act as an advocate for change in policy. The counselor can also help the client explore their political system and develop their own self-advocacy skills.

#### Cultural

Our cultural systems are present in everything we think, do, and feel. This means counselors need to enter into therapeutic relationships with cultural humility. Rachelle (2022) stated, "cultural humility involves an ongoing process of self-exploration and self-critique combined with a willingness to learn from others. It means entering a relationship with another person with the intention of honoring their beliefs, customs, and values." When counselors work through this lens, they are more prepared to offer meaningful treatment that incorporates the client's viewpoint and preferences. Swift and colleagues (2019) identified "counselor preferences (e.g., counselor personality), activity preferences (e.g., talking about one's emotions), and treatment preferences (e.g., 12-step approach) as the primary categories of preferences held by clients" (p. 4). These may be helpful starting points for collaboration.

### Conclusion

Humans are complex, and so is addiction. When not every piece of the puzzle is on the table, the puzzle will never fully show its beautiful illustration. Once we understand our clients using a holistic approach, we can see them as a complete person. We hear their story and understand their journey which has contributed to the diagnosis. We look beyond criteria and begin to work from the client's perspective. Without this foundation, we may miss pieces of the puzzle that need healing or that provide strength. With this foundation, we see more than a diagnosis.



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
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
