

Message from the ICB President

During the holiday season while spending time with family and friends, I always begin thinking about how we can do better in the months ahead and reflect on the past few months to better position our members for what lies ahead.

First, let's revel in the excitement of the recent passage of the 21st Century Cures Act. This landmark legislation creates over \$500 million in State grants to fight opioid abuse by increasing access to care, prevention and a host of other services. I cannot recall a time when the federal government passed such comprehensive funding for those who suffer from substance use disorders and mental illness. Further, this act sheds light on the fact that substance use conditions are both treatable and that shame and stigma should not prevent individuals from seeking or having access to care. Another significant event that took place this year was the recent release of the United States Surgeon General's report on addiction. I cannot recall a time when we have had a Surgeon General leading the path on the importance of addictions treatment and that this remains a treatable condition. I also want to thank many of our State leaders including Director Maria Bruni with her input into the 1115 waiver that supports many of the innovations the addictions field has been doing.

We know that too many of our members and patients are entering the new year with uncertainties of what the State budget impact will be and concerns about the incoming administration in Washington and how the Affordable Care Act will be impacted. Rest assured that the staff of the Illinois Certification Board led by Jessica Hayes have and will continue to position themselves at many of the conversations that our State is conducting as it relates to this field. Jessica has worked tirelessly making sure that certification is represented not only here in Illinois but even earlier in the year participated on workforce issues in Washington. I believe that an informed workforce is also a powerful workforce. Keeping this in mind, Jessica has negotiated with IABH for our members to have access to a limited membership with IABH with the main goal of keeping certified counselors informed on policy discussions taking place. I encourage every member to be optimistic about what lies ahead, and not to let the political gridlock and economic uncertainty dissuade you from the passion you all bring to the field and to those whose voice has been silenced by addiction and mental illness. Our future will always be brighter when we embrace innovation and change. Your board of directors remains focused on this future.

I would be remiss if I didn't acknowledge the outstanding contributions of the leadership we received from the board this year. These volunteers dedicated time both in person and on the phone in service to ICB.

On behalf of the Illinois Certification Board I want to wish everyone a happy holiday and a happy new year.

Participate in Clinical Supervisor Survey for Chance to Win \$50.00

IC&RC, the world leader in the credentialing of addiction-related professionals, is in the process of updating its Job Analysis (JA) for its Certified Clinical Supervisor (CCS) credential.



A JA study is the methodical process IC&RC uses to determine elements of practice and knowledge to assess as part of its certification examinations. It clearly delineates the role of a Clinical Supervisor and the knowledge, skills, and tasks that are necessary to demonstrate competence. The JA will then serve as the content outline for IC&RC's Clinical Supervisor Examination.

As part of the JA study, IC&RC is asking currently practicing Clinical Supervisors (CS) to complete a short survey. The survey rates the importance of tasks performed by an **entry level** CS. For the purpose of this survey, an **entry level** CS is defined as a person who has:

- Prerequisite credential of an IC&RC ADC, AADC, CCJP, CCDP, or CCDPD credential OR a specialty substance abuse credential in another professional discipline in human services at a Master's level or higher
- 30 credit hours of education specific to the CCS examination content outline
- 10,000 hours (5 years) of alcohol and drug counseling experience, with a minimum of 4,000 of those hours (2 years) of clinical practice as a Clinical Supervisor

Respondents should be currently working as a CS and rate each task importance based on **an entry level** CS as described above. Respondents **do not** need to hold a Clinical Supervisor certification or license to participate but should meet or surpass the above-mentioned requirements.

The survey takes approximately 10 minutes to complete.

If you know other Clinical Supervisors currently working in the field, please forward them the link to this survey so they may have an opportunity to provide their feedback.

The survey will be open from **November 21-December 23, 2016**.

Reading, Writing and Recovery! Illinois' First Recovery High School

Adolescent substance use disorders are on the rise. Consistent with the rest of the country, Illinois has seen an increase in opiate addiction and overdose death. While many people are alarmed, adolescent recovery rates do not appear to be increasing. For those who enter treatment, recovery remains a challenge. 100% of adolescents leaving residential treatment are offered drugs their first day back at school. Some youth report not knowing any youth in recovery, while most of their peers get high. Solutions to this problem have to be creative, scientific and require a community effort.

Two years ago a group of committed professionals started meeting to come up with solutions to help adolescents with substance use disorders. They decided to open a recovery high school. The School is a 501c3 organization and has been named Serenity Academy of Chicago. The School founders are Mark Sanders, LCSW, CADC and Joseph Check, LCSW. The purpose of the school is to provide a quality education, for adolescents and emerging adults ages 15-21, leading to a high school diploma, post-secondary educational placement (college) and recovery support for their substance use disorders. There are 35 recovery high schools nationwide and none in Illinois. Our plans are to open the doors September 5, 2017, in downtown Chicago and expand to a suburban location.

There is evidence to support the efficacy of recovery High Schools. Archway Academy, a recovery high school in Houston, Texas has achieved impressive results. The school has an 83% recovery rate, 92% school attendance, a 98% senior graduation rate with 94% of seniors enrolling in college (source: Generation Found, a documentary about recovery high schools). The Board of Directors of Serenity Academy debated whether or not to function as a public or private school. We discussed the fact that the Chicago public schools threaten to go on strike each year. We decided that adolescents and emerging adults seeking recovery do not need to go on strike! The school will operate as a non-profit private school with a sliding scale tuition.

ICB will now feature the latest news from The Illinois Association for Behavioral Health, IABH, formerly known as IADDA. These articles will be the most current news and updates straight from Illinois premier provider association. Below is the first submission which outlines the end of the session legislative update.

As we head into the New Year and the 100th General Assembly in January 2017, we wanted to take an opportunity to close out 2016. Though the 99th General Assembly has two ‘lame duck’ session days scheduled for 2017 on January 9 and 10, we first want to reflect on the bills introduced and passed during the two years of the 99th General Assembly. IABH’s policy team reviews every piece of legislation that is introduced – a total of 10,088 over the past two years! At the end of the 99th GA, the House had an overall 8.21% chance of bill passage and the senate had a 14.31% chance.

*Percent change of the bill passage is the raw calculation of the number of bills passed vs. number of bills introduced.

As you will likely remember, both chambers were scheduled to adjourn session on May 31st, however, legislators failed to pass a budget in that timeframe. In a legislative update from House Appropriations Chairman Greg Harris, he stated ‘As you know, Illinois is in an unprecedented situation never before seen in the history of the US. In his first year in office, Governor Rauner used his total veto power to veto the entire FY16 state budget other than Elementary and Secondary Education. As state government, hospitals and healthcare providers, childcare and senior service providers, colleges and universities, public safety and capital projects began to spiral downwards, we have had to make repeated attempts to slow or reverse the damage.’

In June 2016, budget groups met and legislators passed a stopgap budget, which the Governor signed on June 30th. The stopgap Budget provided appropriations for all of FY16 and half of FY17. During Veto Session (November 15, 16, 17 and November 29, 30, and December 1), the four leaders and Governor met again to discuss the remaining six months of the fiscal year. The Governor announced during one meeting that he would not consider supporting a budget, either another stop gap or total, unless it included a property tax freeze and term limits for members of the General Assembly. Needless to say, the Democrats did not support these comments. In fact, Speaker Madigan issued a statement that he wants a memorandum of understanding from the Governor's office of all past and future agreements on funding agreed to by the Governor. He used the same tactic several years ago, when then Governor Blagojevich switched demands from meeting to meeting. Though the clock is ticking with the stopgap measure expiring on December 31st, negotiations continue.

Inauguration of the 100th General Assembly is January 11, 2017.
