### WORKSHOP A

*“Vicious Cycle: The Challenges of Recovery from Addiction and Trauma”* - Don Pinkston, LCSW, CADC, ATE and Kim Pinkston, MA, LCPC, CADC, BC-DMT, GL-CMA

Using substances to manage fear and anxiety brought on by trauma is less an act of hedonism or rebellion as much as a means of survival. Patients battle intense emotions as a result of traumatic experiences and they have learned substance use provides a temporary, but predictable and effective way of managing the unmanageable. The need for relief often outweighs their knowledge of the long-term consequences. This workshop will provide interventions for helping patients deal with the emotional dysregulation of trauma. Self regulation techniques will be taught for both patients and counselors who deal with this challenging population.

### WORKSHOP B

*“Effectively Addressing the Full Range of Clients”* - Brian Lengfelder, LCPC, CAADC, CCJP, SAP, MAC, ACRPS, CSAT-S, CMAT-S

Substance use counselors are finding themselves overwhelmed and lacking in clinical skills for handling the increasing demands for assessing, diagnosing, treating, and referring of behavioral addictions and co-occurring disorders that are presenting at their agencies. It is important counselors make a professional vow to practice within their scope and make referrals for services they are not competent of providing. It is recommended counselors attend continuing education programs specifically focused on special populations, behavioral addictions, co-occurring disorders, and substance use disorders. Moreover, it is the central focus of a Recovery Oriented System of Care to create an infrastructure to effectively address the full range of clients with substance use disorders and related problems.

### WORKSHOP C

*“What Came First, the Chicken or the Egg: Substance Use Disordered Adolescents and Co-Occurring Disorders”*  
Stella Nicholson, MA, LCPC, CAADC, MAC

This workshop is designed to explore co-occurring disorders and process addictions in the substance use disordered adolescent. It will also examine principles of treatment that lead to favorable outcomes. Current trends and statistics will be examined that lead to competency-based treatment with this population.

*“Drug Intelligence Briefing on Illicit Drug Trends”* - Joseph E. Troiani, Ph.D., CADC  
This workshop will be a drug intelligence briefing on illicit drugs at the international, national, and local levels. The international focus will examine emerging drug trends that have the potential of a national impact. This workshop will also include an examination of the relationship between illicit drug trends and the potential impact at the community level.

**WORKSHOP D**

*“Adult Children of Disordered Parents”*

*Cheri DeMoss, MA, LCPC, CAADC, NCADCII, MAC, NCRS*

The connection between parents’ behaviors determines over 81% of client’s choices in adulthood. Participants will learn the difference between substance use disorders, personality disorders, and dysfunction as well as how to recognize the influences, similarities, and differences that create the fabric of clients’ lives. This workshop will address how to help clients make mindful choices that are grounded in their feelings and interests that make them uniquely who they are without replicating their parents’ actions.

**WORKSHOP E**

*“Those Who Are Serving and Have Served in the Military: An Examination of the Behavioral Health Impact on Their Families and Loved Ones” – Joseph E. Troiani, Ph.D., CADC*

This workshop will focus on the impact of those who are serving in the military (Active Duty, Reserves, or National Guard) or have served in the military (Veterans or Retirees) has on their families. The focus will be on the behavioral health impact on their spouses/partners, children, parents, and siblings. This will also include understanding how they cope with a loved one being disabled, a death, or being Missing in Action/Prisoner of War. A broad review of resources and programs will be discussed.

**WORKSHOP F**

*“Tailoring Addictions Treatment: A Focus on the Unique Treatment Needs of Men and Women Seeking Recovery”*

*Mark Sanders, LCSW, CADC*

This workshop will review strategies to address the unique treatment needs of men and women seeking recovery. It will address core issues for male clients, including difficulty expressing feelings, toxic masculinity, the shield of armor, and resistance to counseling. Additionally, for female clients, it will discuss how to provide gender responsiveness services for seeking recovery, 21 critical areas to focus on in treatment, and 3 approaches to addictions and trauma recovery with women. Strategies for increasing gender competence on the individual and programmatic levels and viewing countertransference as a gift when counseling women and men will be explored.

**WORKSHOP G**

*“Clinical Blind Spots: Behavioral Addictions” – Brian Lengfelder, LCPC, CAADC, CCJP, SAP, MAC, ACRPS, CSAT-S, CMAT-S*

Addictive behaviors can occur in many forms and are often unrecognized and untreated in the substance use disorder population. Often, it is assumed that physical dependence characterized by withdrawal symptoms due to substance use is required for someone to be diagnosed with an addiction disorder, but the fact is that behavior addictions can occur with all the negative consequences in a person’s life. It is the obsessive and compulsive nature of the behavior that is often indicative of a behavioral addiction. Many individuals are engaged in addiction interaction disorder with substances and behaviors and require appropriate assessment and interventions to have successful recovery efforts.

This review will include an overview of roles, responsibilities, and processes that a CRSS professional is permitted to undertake, in keeping with the terms of their professional credential. Also included will be a review of applicable laws, licensing bodies, and regulations that describe requirements and define the scope of practice for CRSS professionals.

### WORKSHOP 3

*“Navigating the Secretary of State Hearing Process”*

The Secretary of State Administrative Hearing Process is complex, confusing, and very challenging. The workshop will explain the entire process, from the initial intake of a Petitioner to actually getting their driving privileges reinstated. It will explain how someone’s driving privileges are initially suspended and/or revoked and what needs to be done to have those driving privileges reinstated.

### WORKSHOP 4

*“Who is the Client? Meet the Family”*

As family research indicates, participation by family members and significant others in a young person’s recovery from substance use disorders is important. Not only is this important for the young person but it is important for the family members. However, many clinicians and families alike do not recognize the family and significant others are often in need of their own services such as education, therapy, and ongoing support. To assist professionals in their work with the new “client,” the family, a review of research related to families will be shared. To achieve a deeper understanding of a loved one’s journey in recovery, a panel of family members with “lived experience” will share their story and answer questions.

*“Medication Assisted Therapy for Opioid Use Disorder: Evidence-based Antidote to the Prescription Drug and Heroin Crisis”*

This workshop will discuss the theory and practice of established medical treatments for opioid addiction. Participants will be better able to understand the mechanisms of action of available opiate agonists, methadone and buprenorphine; contrast opiate receptor antagonist therapy, naltrexone, and its approved forms of administration; assess appropriate candidates for agonist versus antagonist therapies; and critique practical experience in rates of treatment success utilizing either mode of intervention.

### WORKSHOP 6

*“Illinois Specific National Certified Recovery Specialist (NCRS)”*

Participants will learn the who, what, where, and how to becoming certified as a National Certified Recovery Support Specialist in the State of Illinois.

### WORKSHOP 7

*“When the Titanic Meets the Iceberg: Addressing the Trauma Beneath Addiction, Mental Illness, Criminality, and Self-Harming Behavior”* - *Mark Sanders, LCSW, CADC*

This workshop will provide a history of trauma treatment in America and the link between trauma, addiction, mental illness, criminality, and self harming behavior. The diagnosis and evidence based treatment of 5 types of traumatic stress disorders which co-occur with addiction will be discussed. Participants will learn how to develop a trauma informed system of care and how to avoid secondary PTSD.

### WORKSHOP 8

*“The Effectiveness of HIV and Hep C Treatment in IDOC Prisons Through Telemedicine”*

*Brian W. Drummond, MSW, CCJP, CADC, CODPI*

The workshop will provide information on the challenges and successes of prison-based HIV and HCV treatments and education on the preparation for the transitional process from pre- to post-release services. It will include education on HIV medication failed patients, HIV naïve patients contemplating beginning antiretroviral (ART) medications, challenges with maintaining adherence and the specialized approaches to engaging patients in the preparation process for transition from prison to the community. There will be a strong emphasis on the engagement and retention techniques employed to increase the likelihood of long-term engagement in medical care, medication adherence, and medical case management services.

**WORKSHOP 9**

*“Staying Nimble in a Challenging Environment: Lessons in Leadership from the Opioid Pandemic” (A Training of Leaders Presentation)*  
Michael Moran, MA, CAADC, ATE and Don Pinkston, LCSW, CADC, ATE

The current opioid crisis, like others (HIV, methamphetamine, cocaine) before it requires leadership to identify and utilize resources in a relatively immediate way to reduce the significant negative consequences and even deaths that accompany this problem. This workshop will help participants identify a leadership process to address these cyclical crises that are the history of the substance use field. Topics will include the ability to respond to data with programmatic interventions and methods to influence and increase staff participation in new programming.

**WORKSHOP 10**

*“Counseling Older Male Clients”*

As men in their 60s and 70s face new challenges that influence their identities and their relationships, they often increase their use of alcohol and other substances. This coping strategy often generates even more issues. This workshop will examine how to effectively engage male elders in a process of self-examination and change.

**WORKSHOP 11**

*“Cognitive Behavioral Intervention Programs Within the Criminal Justice System”*

Timothy O’Boyle, MS, CADC, QMHP, ICB Board Member

This workshop will examine the therapeutic community (TC) and its highly regulated daily regimen with clearly stated expectations for behavior, including peer to peer accountability, consequential and social learning, right living concepts, gradients of internalizations, and the roles of learning. Participants will be introduced to the ideas of a structure board of hierarchy within the community and education and vocational programs to treat the individuals with a holistic approach. This workshop will also provide the success stories of men who have completed the Certified Associate Addictions Professional training program within a TC and have gone on to become professionals in the helping field.
